Every penny of the £22,088 raised (including Gift Aid) will be distributed. Each one of the 69 teams nominates it's own charity and they keep 50% of the money raised. Rotary Congleton divides it's share between its own two nominated charities. This year, Listen Out Loud will receive approximately half of the money and so too will The Old Saw Mill.

Cheques are going out to the various teams that took part in this year's highly successful Swimathon. Rachel and I presented a cheque to Smallwood School on Friday 19th April. The school head confirmed that they would be adding a third team next year made up of teachers and others to add to the 2 pupil teams they normally provide.

Fourteen of us including Rotarians and partners attended the Rotary District Conference during the weekend of 27th and 28th April at Llandudno.

It started with a number of clubs explaining the projects they have bee n involved in recently, including 3 clubs from the Isle of Man who combined to initiate a £100K environmental project involving planting 10,000 trees. Whilst a club in St Helens managed to united all local charities/organisations under a simple bar code system, not only informing every one of their activities, but making them available to everyone by one creating a simple point of access. The project and their other work was also recognised by an award from the King

Not surprisingly, we heard about the importance of engaging members at every point in our individual clubs to ensure we give them every opportunity to contribute their views and get involved in our various clubs and community activities. This is to try and ensure members are not lost, as apparently 52% of new members leave within the first 2 years of joining Rotary. We also learned about new ways to attract more members and will be hearing more about Rotary in Great Britain and Ireland's massive NORTH STAR initiative where different forms of membership will be explored.

On Sunday we had a review of the support given to Ukrainians and were entertained by some Ukrainian children, followed by a Rotaract group of children explaining the various projects they created in their school in Bolton. The conference ended though with an outstanding finale provided by Geoff Machey, a fellow Rotarian and a past Rotaractor, an inspirational and very funny speaker, and someone who you could not ignore – as a member of Biddulph Rotary Club found out to his cost when he decided to take a trip to the toilet during his presentation!

It is almost coming to the end of my presidential year, which seems to have passed by very quickly with only a few weeks left to go.

There have been lots of highlights during the year, in particular the progress being made with many of our project teams which go from strength to strength. In my view, speaker evenings are becoming a lot more interesting when they are provided by our own club members, with some great presentations recently from both Bob and Stew.

Swati spoke of Rotary's aims to conduct a digital media campaign in the district to attract new members, following on from lessons learnt from a pilot scheme run last year in the Stockport area. Rotary is expanding its thinking to recruit more people with busy working lives to join and spend what time they can as Rotarians, rather than following a strict commitment to attend regular meetings. The thinking is to create a modern model of the traditional Rotary club by forming 'satellite clubs' to involve more people and run alongside the existing club structure.

In a fascinating talk to members of the club, he described some of the forensic details necessary to uncover some of the sophisticated tricks used by modern-day fraudsters who are mostly just one step ahead of the law!

Bob's career took him from Ipswich to London and then on to a global role in a fraudsters' business calculated to be worth \$3.7 trillion per annum. Only £200bn of that comes from the UK, whilst £8bn is fraud against individuals. Bob gave the meeting s ome helpful tips on how to avoid becoming the victim of the fraudsters.

Head judge Trevor Hoyle said that the afternoon had proved stressful for the judges as the quality of the food was so good and the marks were so very close between the contestants.

Les Wassall, food director and executive chef of the Pear Hospitality Group, said he would be happy to take one of the dishes – a lemon posset and shortbread and put it on the menu in any of his units! He congratulated all of the contestants.

Rotary District Governor Dr. Swati Muhkerjee, herself a cook, said that nevertheless, she could not have achieved the quality of the dishes at the age of the contestants!

In third place was Mahjabeen from Sharples School, Bolton with her hot glazed chicken with egg fried rice.

In second place Alfie from Eaton Bank Academy in Congleton delighted with pan-seared duck breast with a confit duck potato rostiwith butternut squash puree and wilted spinach and red wine jus. His tarte au citron with blackberry garnish impressed the judges.

Overall winner was Nathaniel from Fallibroome Academy in Macclesfield. His seasonal lunch with Stanedge rack of lamb, dauphinoise potatoes, spring harvest carrots, asparagus and fresh mint sauce, followed by deconstructed strawberry and rhubarb crumble topped with frozen yoghurt, impressed the judges.

Congleton High School's Samuel and Elkie and Sharples School's Saffiya were all highly commended.

The First Prize is one to be worked for! Nathaniel received an apron, a book and a day with Marriott Hotel Group's executive chef, preparing dinner for his parents. The prize is not to be underestimated. A previous winner of the Rotary Young Chef competition, recently went on to become a finalist in the BBC Masterchef competition on national television.
