sun shone and the showers threatened but held off.


Every Rotarian contributes to its central charity – the Rotary Foundation - one of the world's largest charities – and one that actively promotes peace, supports education, the environment, medical interventions, clean water and disaster aid. It is probably still best-known as instigating - and with its 1.4 million members - supporting the worldwide polio inoculation campaign with over \$2.6bn. since 1985. The proceeds from lan's garden party games, hog roast and bar, divided between the Congleton and Biddulph clubs, will go to support Rotary Foundation. (When Rotary runs fundraising events in and around town, all the money raised is spent locally).

So it was that around 150 friends and relations played Tombola, hunted to find bottles of wine, played countdown, skittles and other games. Jo told the judges that significant changes were made to the Tree of Light in December 2023. In line with Rotary-Congleton's Environmental ethos, the plastic stars were replaced with wooden shapes and the plastic ties were replaced with biodegradable twine. The wooden shapes were hung directly on the tree rather than on the metal fences. The overall effect was very positively received and looked more natural, in addition to being environmentally friendly.

The judges were familiar with Rotary Tree of Light schemes in other towns and were interested to hear about the environmental changes that we had made in Congleton. They congratulated Jo for the project and for steering it in a positive direction.

The Tree of Light will be back again throughout the Christmas season.

It was a wonderful evening celebrating many students with numerous awards. The Alumni speaker Adrian Young is currently a Sergeant in the Royal Air Force. He gave an excellent overview of his school days at CHS and his fast-moving career in the RAF.

Later in the evening, several 'special awards' were presented. The Partnership Recognition Award was indeed a surprise when the head of CHS said that Rotary were a major part of the school's community activities, and Rod was then presented with a basket of flowers by Sgt Young. Rod knew Adrian from his air cadet days and also the head of governors at CHS, Mr Rich Benson. Rod thanked CHS on behalf of Rotary and congratulated all the students on their awards.



Rotary-Congleton and Streetscape came together to create a wildflower garden in the shape of a heart in the Market Place Gardens, to the rear of the town hall. Rotary provided sufficient seeds to ensure repeat plantings so that the wildflowers will come back year after year. Streetscape prepared the site and added additional top-soil to the site.

Chief officer of Congleton Town Council, David McGifford said "It's really great! The council is keen to expand its wildflower plantings across the town, with obvious benefits to the environment and the community as a whole."

Rotarian Simon Fallis instigated the plan to create the heart in the centre of the town. He said that The Rotary 'heart' reflects the town's motto of being 'A small town with a big heart.'

Rotary organisation has the environment as one of its key areas of interest around the world.

Such has been the success of the local environmental initiatives that Simon Fallis has now been invited to take responsibility for Rotary District's 62 clubs throughout the northwest of England.

President lan Robinson said that he was proud of the initiatives that the club was taking in supporting the environment and the leadership that Congleton is providing in encouraging Rotary clubs throughout the northwest to share their ideas and plans in their own towns.

#### STOP THINK PROTECT!



The burgeoning threat of online Fraud is exercising the minds of Cheshire Police! Detective Constable Andrew Kevan knows all about it, and imparted a great deal of his knowledge in how to protect smartphones and computers in an hour-long talk to Rotary-Congleton's members and friends. (Astbury Golf Club, Monday 15th July).

His high-speed, content-filled presentation outlined the threats from email, social media and online dating. He stressed the methods by which software companies 'scrape' data from everything we do on our phones and either sell the data, or learn about our movements and buying preferences.

One particular piece of advice concerned password security and how to check if a password has been compromised. Andrew is an advocate of using three memorable words, rather than the difficult to remember scramble of words, numbers and symbols!

The final – and perhaps most worrying – section of his talk concerned the arrival of AI (Artificial Intelligence) and how criminals could use images from social media posts to create false identities.

#### Remember, Remember the Second of November!

Congleton's popular Bonfire in the Park is on **Saturday, 2nd November** this year. The event usually fills the park to capacity with around 5,000 families and friends enjoying the show. Rotary stresses the safety and environmental aspects of organised displays, with commercial fireworks costing many thousands of pounds and a professional team with full security and safety procedures in place on site - as opposed to unregulated events in the back garden.

The format remains more or less the same as in previous years with the park open to the public at 5pm. The procession to light the fire starts at 6pm.

There will be two firework displays. The first at 6.30 will feature quiet fireworks for families with young children and for anyone with any sensory issues. The second display at 7.30 will be the full, professional display of aerial fireworks and loud bangs.

Organiser Rtn. Eddie Roberts says that fairground rides and sidestalls will be back and the club hopes to provide a greater choice of food. Alcoholic drinks are not allowed in the park after dark and due to the nature of the event.

The Rotary Club has enhanced the event and is providing more lighting including a 100m festoon of lights to illuminate the main entrance path to the event. Further mobile toilet facilities have been booked to add to the existing park toilets.

For the first time a family ticket is being offered for two adults and two children. If bought in advance the family ticket will cost £22. Adult tickets are £8 and children from 5 to 13 pay just £5 with under fives getting in free.

On the day, the family ticket rises to £30, adults £10 and children £6.

Tickets will be on sale at the Congleton Information Centre at the Town Hall from now until November 2nd. Rotary will have gazebos in the town centre on selected Saturdays throughout October. Tickets can be purchased by card or cash.

#### **Come on Guys!**

As in previous years, primary schools and nurseries will be invited to compete to build a Guy Fawkes to sit on top of the fire with a cash prize for the winners.
